

### Chief Barnard Back In States

#### From Carrier Duty In Korea

Chief Aviation Machinist Mate S. R. Barnard, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Barnard, of Franklin, Route 3, recently returned to the United States after a tour of duty as chief petty officer in charge of the helicopter aboard the aircraft carrier USS Kearsarge. It has been announced.

As crew chief, the announcement explained, it was Chief Barnard's responsibility to keep the helicopter in tip-top flying condition. The unit, a part of Navy Helicopter Squadron One

(HU-1), the only navy helicopter squadron with units presently operating in Korea, performed five rescues while in the Far East. Four of the rescues were pilots whose planes were ditched at sea, and one was a sailor who had fallen overboard from a destroyer, the announcement said.

A veteran of 13 and a half years in the navy, Chief Barnard was stationed in Australia during World War II. He and his wife and two children are living at San Ysidro, Calif.
