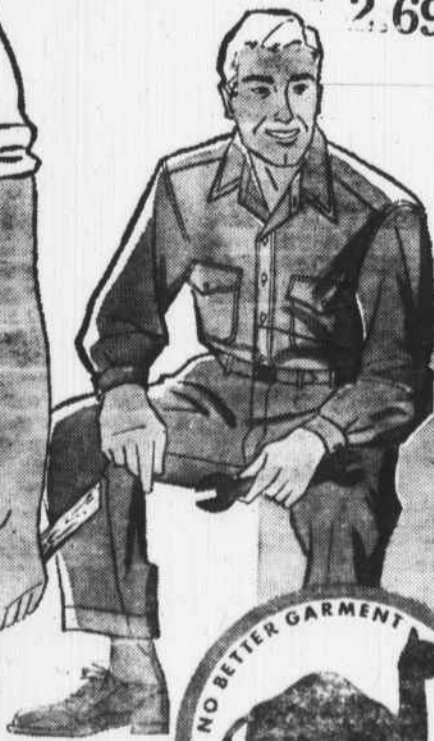

THE COOKING CORNER Favorite Recipes OF MACON WOMEN

BROWNIE MIX

Make brownies in a jiffy from this mix made ahead. Easiest way to mix the ingredients is in large paper bag.

Sift into bag
4 cups sifted plain flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
4 teaspoons salt

Mix together
8 cups sugar
2 1/2 cups cocoa, sifted

Pour into bag, fold open end over. Grasp both ends and shake back and forth. Pour into large bowl or pan.

Cut in
2 cups shortening (butter preferred)

Store covered in cool place (bottom shelf of refrigerator, for example).

Makes enough for 8 batches of brownies.

BROWNIES

Beat 2 eggs
Add 1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups brownie mix.
Blend. Mixture will not be smooth.

Mix in 2/3 cup chopped nuts. Bake in greased pan in 350° oven about 20 minutes or until they leave sides of pan. Cut into squares and remove from pan.
