horses at 64,000 on January 1 this year continued to follow the downward trend which has been in effect since the end of World War II. Hogs on farms on January 1, at 1,035,000, dropped noticeably from the 1,203,-000 a year ago. There were 49,-000 sheep on farms-1.000 more than January 1, 1953. All chickens at 12,404,000 were slightly above the 12,348,000 a year ear-lier, while turkeys at 67,000 compare with 60,000 on Janu-

ary 1, 1953. For the nation, the number of cattle and calves on farms and ranches January 1, 1954, was estimated at 94,677,000—a new all-time record. Hogs on United States farms were esti-mated at 48,179,000 head, the smallest number since 1938. Stock sheep numbers on farms and ranches, estimated at 26,-905,000 head, were 3 per cent below a year earlier and 20 per cent below the 1943-52 average. Horses on farms January 1954, are estimated at 3,432,000 head, a decrease of 10 per cent from a year ago. During 1953 mule numbers declined about 9 per cent to an estimated 1.603,-000 head.
