Bids for the project were opened by the Macon County Board of Education in special session Saturday morning.

The proposed construction of lunchrooms at Otto and Cowee was mentioned only conversationally.

"We haven't given up yet," J. C. Sorrells, board chairman declared. No funds are available for their construction.

One of five submitted to the board, Mr. Stewart's bid was 16 cents per cubic yard or \$2,001.92 for the entire job of cutting down the old gymnasium hill. The project entails moving about 12,500 yards of dirt in addition to the rubble left when the gymnasium burned ast March.


