



Following is Mr. Bethune's letter to the town: "We are enclosing, herewith,

a corrected recertification of the 1953 and 1954 excess valution of the Western Telephone Company. During the year 1952, the Western Carolina Telephone Company purchased from the Southern Bell Telephone Company the Murphy exchange and a network of allied toll circuits, and in addition to that, it merged with four other telephone companies under the name of the Western Carolina Telephone Company with toll centers and exchanges located at Marion, Sylva, and Franklin, North Carolina.

"The Western Carolina Telephone Company, in filing with the State Board of Assessment its report for 1953, made some errors in computing and consolidating the wire line mileage that was taken over in the merger. These errors have affected the distribution of the valuation to some of the counties, cities, and towns in which it operates.

"Through the cooperation of the Western Carolina Telephone Company, and the Chief Tele phone Accountant of the North Carolina Utilities Commission. we have determined the correct wire line mileage for the years 1953 and 1954, which is reflected in the recertification certificates enclosed.

"We regret that a number of the affected counties, cities, towns will have to make tax adjustments to correspond with this report. However, we feel that the future years will work out to the satisfaction of all concerned, by reason of this effort of correction.

"Any adjustment you make in the tax, with respect to com-plying with this report, will be made directly with the West-ern Carolina Telephone Company.
