Mix the sugar and corn starch. Add the buttermilk and egg yolks. Cook in double boiler until thick, add vanilla and salt. Use egg whites for meringue. This filling is much like lemon pie.

that date, 14 men also will be sent for pre-induction examinations.

Number Of Animal  
Hospitals Doubles  
In 12-Year Period

The number of animal hospitals in the United States has more than doubled in the last eight years, according to reports today on a recent survey.

The American Foundation for

Animal Health cites a nationwide study showing that there are now 2,674 hospitals devoted to the care of animals. Nearly 1,600 were constructed during the years 1946-53, compared with some 300 built during the 1930's.

The development of advanced techniques in the veterinary medical field was given as one of the major factors responsible for the sharp increase in hospital facilities within the last decade.

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
