Swain High's boys halted Franklin's chances of throwing three teams into a tie for top spot in the western division of the Smoky Mountain Conference last Thursday night as they trampled the Panthers 57 to 41.

The Franklin lasses clinched the conference division title with a 46 to 39 win to end a season of undefeated play.

Jodie Lenior sparked the girls to an early lead, hitting 11 points in the opening stanza. The Franklin squad led 22 to 16 at the intermission and the teams matched points in the second half. Lenior was tops in the scoring department with 20, followed by Audrey Gibson with 16.

Goals For Win

Franklin's boys entered the game with a victory meaning a tie between Swain, Cherokee, and Franklin for top spot in the division. Swain took the victory and the title, finishing the year with a 12-2 record. Cherokee dropped three games and Franklin four to place second and third, respectively.

Swain jumped to an early 11 to 2 advantage and at the half was ahead 31 to 20. Franklin was never able to get back into the game, falling behind by five more points by the end of the game. Bobby Jack Love sacked 15 points for high scoring honors among the Panthers.

Here Is Chemistry In The Home

A new method for whitening discolored nylon garments. Have your white nylon garments become so discolored that ordinary washing and bleaching will not restore their whiteness. If so, we suggest a method which should make them look fresh and white. It is important to follow the steps in the order given—many garments may not need all the steps for satisfactory results.

1. Wash garments thoroughly with soap or synthetic detergent by hand or in a washing machine, depending on the construction and type of garment.

2. Into approximately one gallon of hot water (160 degrees) in an enamel container add one package of "color remover" and immediately add wet garments. Stir gently while maintaining temperature. If after 30 minutes whiteness

is restored evenly, remove garments and rinse thoroughly in hot water. If whiteness was not restored, leave in 30 additional minutes. Temperatures in excess of 160 degrees may set wrinkles that are difficult to remove by ironing.

3. Into approximately one gallon of warm water add two tablespoonfuls of "Clorox" and two tablespoonfuls of a detergent. Immerse garments and with occasional stirring let soak for 30 minutes. Rinse thoroughly in warm water.

4. For final rinse, immerse garment in approximately one gallon of warm water containing a tablespoonful of an optical whitener. Drip dry and iron with a steam iron or a dry iron at "rayon" setting.

Any precautions supplied by the manufacturers of any product used should be followed.

State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Question: How often should eggs be marketed?

Answer: At least once a week, and preferably twice a week.

Question: Is North Carolina cultivating most of its good land?

Answer: No. This state is cultivating only about half of its land capable of permanent cultivation. Large areas of idle and wooded land could be brought in to production through drainage in the Coastal Plain, contour tillage and strip cropping in the Piedmont and by moving pastures to the hillsides in the Mountains.

Question: Are plant diseases on the increase?

Answer: To a certain extent, yes, but many of our supposedly "new" diseases have been with us for a long time. More intensive farming naturally causes disease problems to mount, but many of their abundance these days is because they are being identified.
