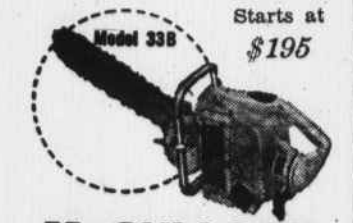
Proceeds from the event, which is set for 7:30, will go to the Highlands band.

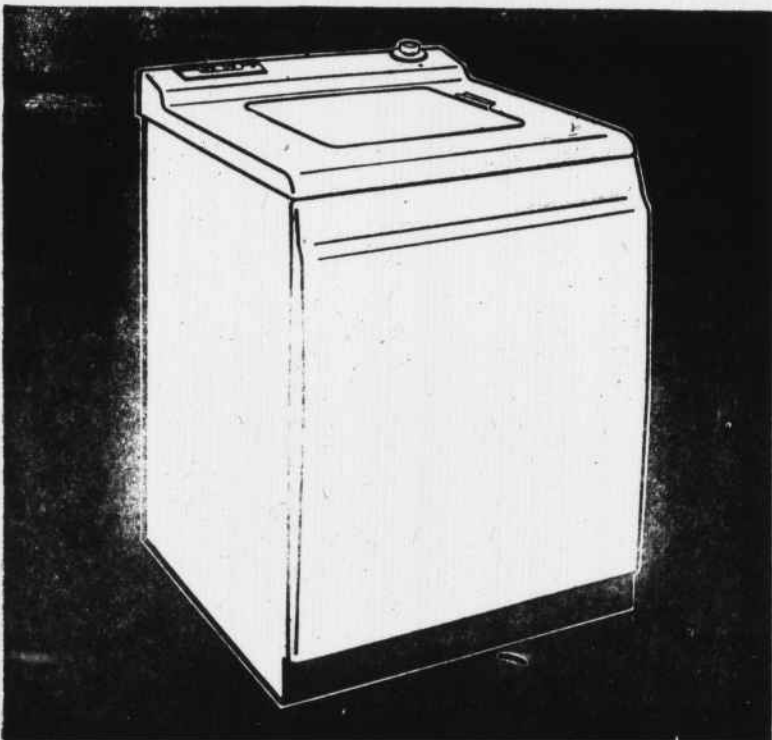

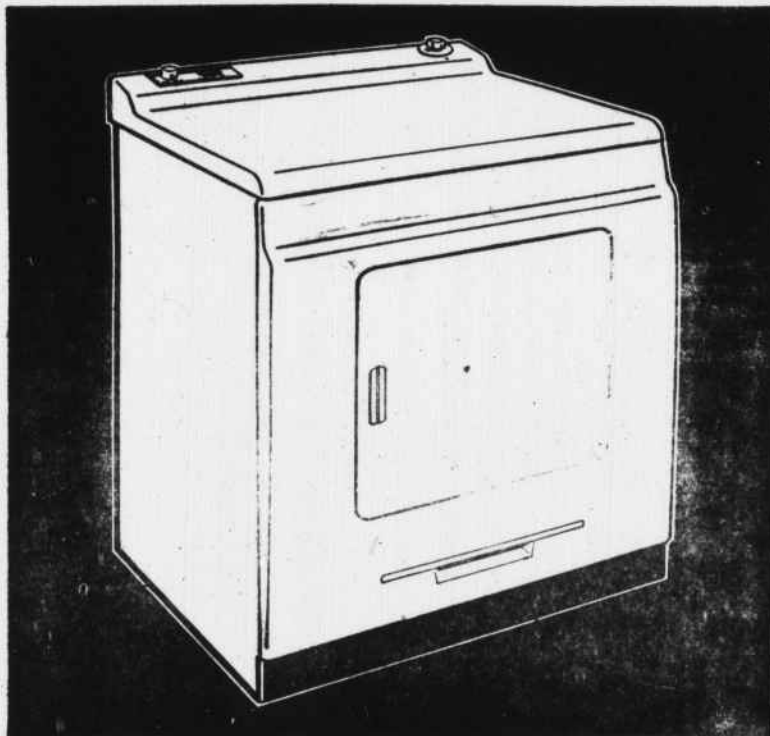
