ICE BOX COOKIES

½ cup butter  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 egg  
½ teaspoon soda  
¾ cups plain flour  
½ teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon cinnamon  
½ teaspoon vanilla  
½ cup unbroken nut meats  
Cream butter, sugar, beat in egg. Sift dry ingredients and add to butter mixture with vanilla and nut meats.

Shape dough into long roll about 2 inch in diameter. Wrap in aluminum foil. Chill it until hard. Slice in very thin slices.

Bake on greased sheet in moderately hot 400° oven for about 5 to 10 minutes.

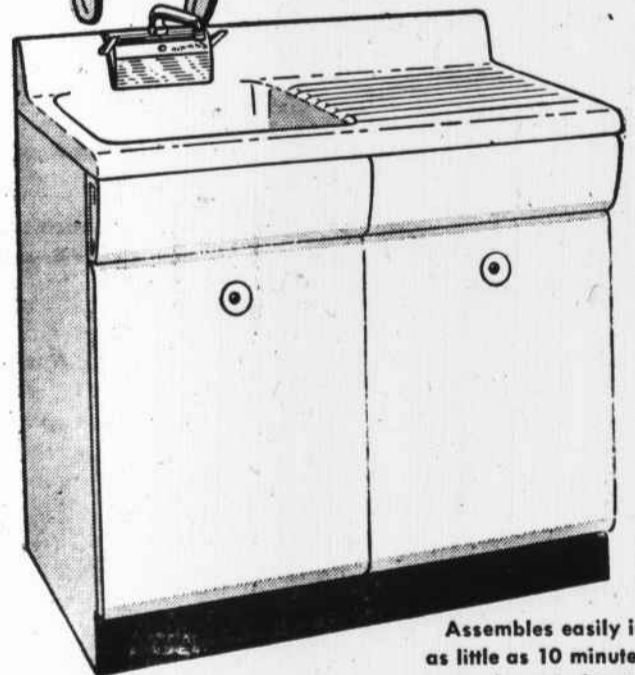
