Macon Native Dies March 23 At Age 80; Rites At Watauga

Mrs. Malashia Potts Sanders, a native of the Cowee section, died Wednesday of last week (March 23) at the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Claude Scott, on Franklin, Route 5.

Eighty years old, Mrs. Sanders had been ill for the last two years.

Funeral services were conducted the following day at 3 p.m. at the Watauga Baptist Church, of which she was a member. The Rev. Joe Bishop, pastor, assisted by the Rev. Arvil Swafford, officiated and burial was in the church cemetery.
