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SKILLET SUPPER, JAPANESE-STYLE



Want to try something new in easy entertaining? Then borrow an idea from the Orient and serve a Sukiyaki supper. Part of the fascination will be in the preparation, so bring out the fixings on a large platter and let everyone watch the Sukiyaki being made, either in an electrical skillet as illustrated or in an ordinary skillet over a heating unit.

Start the menu with a clear soup and end it with almond cakes, but be sure to serve the main course with rice and beer—a beverage that's more appropriate than you may think for beer is a Japanese favorite as well as tea.

SUKIYAKI
1 pound round steak
3 tablespoons olive oil

2 medium onions, sliced
1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, sliced
12 scallions, sliced
6 stalks celery, sliced
1/2 pound fresh spinach, chopped
1 8-ounce can bamboo shoots
1/2 cup beef consommé
1/4 cup soy sauce
1 tablespoon sugar

Cut meat crossgrain into paper-thin slices. Heat olive oil in skillet. Add meat and sauté until browned. Add vegetables; cover and sauté about 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Pour in combined beef consommé, soy sauce and sugar. Mix well. Cook uncovered over low heat 15 minutes, or until vegetables are just tender. Makes 6 servings.
