Seven-year-old Benny Shope, Franklin second grader confined to Angel Hospital for treatment of rheumatic fever, made history Monday morning when he rolled over on his stomach, thinking he was going to have his back massaged.

Dr. Edgar Angel popped the unsuspecting youngster in the backside with the first shot of the new Salk polio vaccine administered in this county.

And even as Benny's startled exclamation died out, other members of the Macon Medical Society and the staff of the local health department were ironing out the final wrinkles in a mass vaccination program to give the beginning shots to some 535 first and second graders. (Second grader Benny's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lake V. Shope, requested he be given his first shot since he would be unable to attend a clinic with his classmates.)
