**LIME PIE**

INGREDIENTS: 1 package lime Jello, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup hot water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 large can Pet milk, juice of 2 lemons, chilled.

METHOD: Dissolve Jello in hot water, add sugar and salt, stirring until dissolved. Let stand until cool. Chill Pet Milk and

also chill large mixing bowl and rotary egg beater. Cover two 8-inch pie dishes with crushed vanilla wafers, using whole wafers around the edges. Whip Pet Milk, add lemon juice slowly, whip until cream is heavy. Whip Jello mixture until creamy and thick. Combine the two. Pour into pie plates. Chill. Top with layers of whipped cream just before serving. Makes 12 servings. This is delicious frozen.
