THE COOKING CORNER

Favorite Recipes Of MACON WOMEN

BROWN SUGAR BROWNIES

2/3 Cups shortening (butter or margarine)
2 1/4 Cups brown sugar (1 lb.)
3 Eggs
2 2/3 Cups sifted all purpose flour
2 Tsp. baking powder
1 Tsp. salt
1 Cup walnuts (coarsely chopped)
1 Package (6 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate

Start oven at 350 degrees and grease a 10 1/2 x 15 1/2 baking pan. Melt shortening in sauce pan, just to melting point. Stir in brown sugar; cool slightly, then beat in the eggs, one at a time, until mixture is smooth. Sift flour, baking powder, and salt together and stir into brown sugar mixture. Now add nuts and chocolate. Pour into greased baking pan. Bake 25 minutes. When almost cool cut into bars 1 x 3 inches. (These keep nicely for overseas packages).
