### New Chemical Products Bring Poison Hazards

The thousands of chemical products developed to make life simpler may only complicate it unless used with care and intelligence, the Medical Society of the State of North Carolina warns.

Based on information compiled by the committee on toxicology of the American Medical Association, State Medical Society officials called attention to the fact that there are about a quarter of a million brand name chemical products which may be used in the home, farming and industry.

All of them may be useful — but handled improperly they may become killers, cripples, and destroyers of property.

Understanding of the uses and potential dangers of the wealth of products available is needed to prevent the estimated 3,300 accidental poison deaths which result each year from misuse of chemicals.

The array is so large and so many combinations of chemicals are possible that no complete catalogue of all available products has been made, the committee said.

As part of its campaign to spread information about these products and their hazards, the committee will sponsor a symposium on health hazards of chemicals December 29 during the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, in Atlanta, Ga.
