

Thumm Discusses Church Work At Methodist Meet

Approximately 35 men from Methodist churches throughout the county Tuesday night heard the Rev. M. V. Thumm discuss his work as director of the Wesley Foundation at Western Carolina College.

The occasion was the January meeting of the Macon County Methodist Men's Club, held at Bethel church.

The Wesley Foundation is the college level counterpart of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the guest speaker explained. It seeks to provide "a home away from home, under Christian influence, within the framework of the church", he said.

Mr. Thumm is pastor of the Cullowhee Methodist Church, head of the Wesley Foundation, and a part-time instructor in religion on the faculty of the college. Since there are only two churches at Cullowhee — the Baptist and Methodist — much of his work is with non-Methodist students, he said. Forty-one Methodists, however, have voluntarily become affiliate members of his church, he said.

With the church used for a variety of student activities, it is becoming too small — "the congregation is being crowded out of its own church" by student work; and the speaker said a movement is on foot to enlarge the structure.

At a business session, a report was heard on the prison camp project, and the present committee was instructed to bring to the next meeting a concrete proposal for starting activities at the camp, after a conference with the prison superintendent, E. G. Crawford and Lake V. Shope were appointed a committee on arrangements for future meetings, and the group voted to renew its lease on the youth camp at Wilson Lick.

R. S. Jones, president, presided. Women of the Bethel church served the dinner.
