APPLE AND RAISIN PIE

- 4 cups sliced apples 1 cup water
- 112 teaspoons flour
- 2 cup sugar teaspoon cinnamon
- cup seedless raisins 2 tablespoons butter

Cook apples in water (covered five minutes. Cool. Sift flour sugar, and cinnamon into raisins and add to apples. Line pie pan with pastry, pour in filling, and dot with butter. Place strips of pastry over top in lattice design. Bake in a very hot oven (450°F) 10 minutes. Reduce temperature to moderate (350°) and bake 40

minutes longer, or until fruit is tender. Makes one nine-inch pie.


