



Here's How To Get Larger **Broiler Share**

"There are two ways to get a larger share of the broiler market," according to Clayton P. Libeau, poultry and egg marketing specialist at North Carolina State College.

"One is to sell better broilers at lower cost and the other is to furnish the same product with better services than competing areas," he says.

Mr. Libeau points out that re-cent figures from official U.S. Department of Agriculture sources show the commercial broiler-feed ratio in North Carolina as 3.2. This means that one pound of live broiler will buy 3.2 pounds of feed. This is the lowest point reached in North Carolina, he adds, and lower than any other state in the nation. Mr. Libeau warns that if this condition should continue over a long period of time, it may discourage broiler production in North Carolina as compared to other states.

Two factors can change this sit uation of low broiler-feed ratio in North Carolina, he feels. One is higher broiler prices. He says one way to obtain higher prices is to
