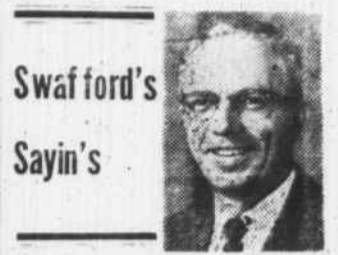

I wouldn't dare tell you exactly how I made my new formula — that will make things move faster than lightning — but I will let you in on part of it.

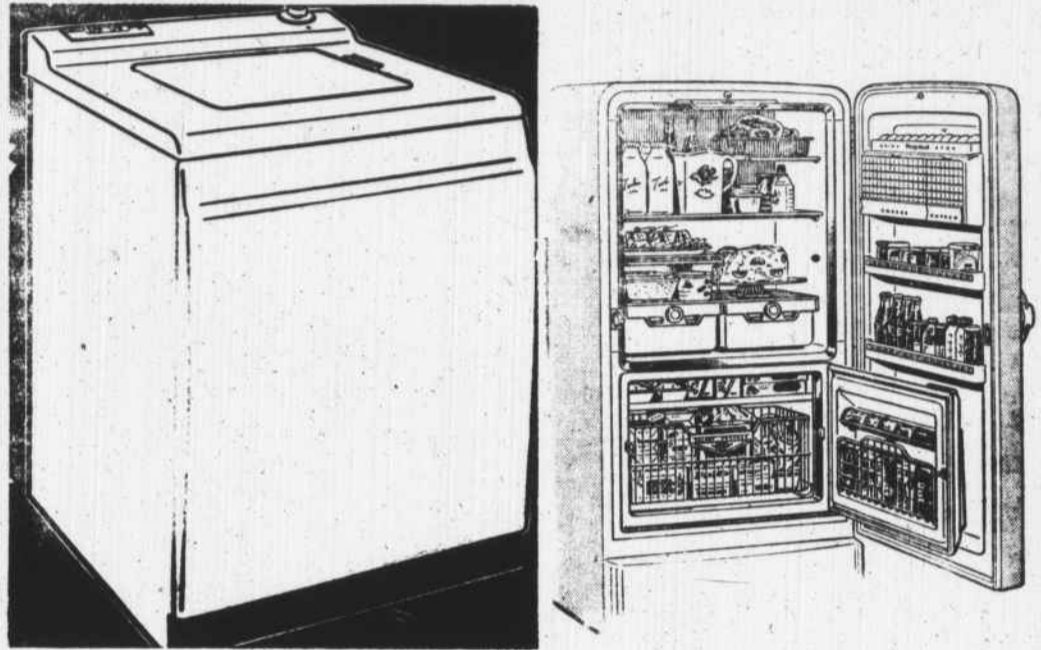
