

Guernseys Of Slagle Set Milking Records

Two registered Guernseys owned by A. B. Slagle, of this county, have recently completed official production records in the advanced registry division of the American Guernsey Cattle Club, it has been announced.

Belmont View Brilliant Rose, a junior three-year-old, produced 10,433 pounds of milk and 515 pounds of fat in 365 days. She was milked two times daily.

Belmont View Bonwick Thelma, a junior two-year-old, produced 10,430 pounds of milk and 477 pounds of fat in 365 days with milking twice daily.

The announcement said the official production records were supervised by N. C. State College.

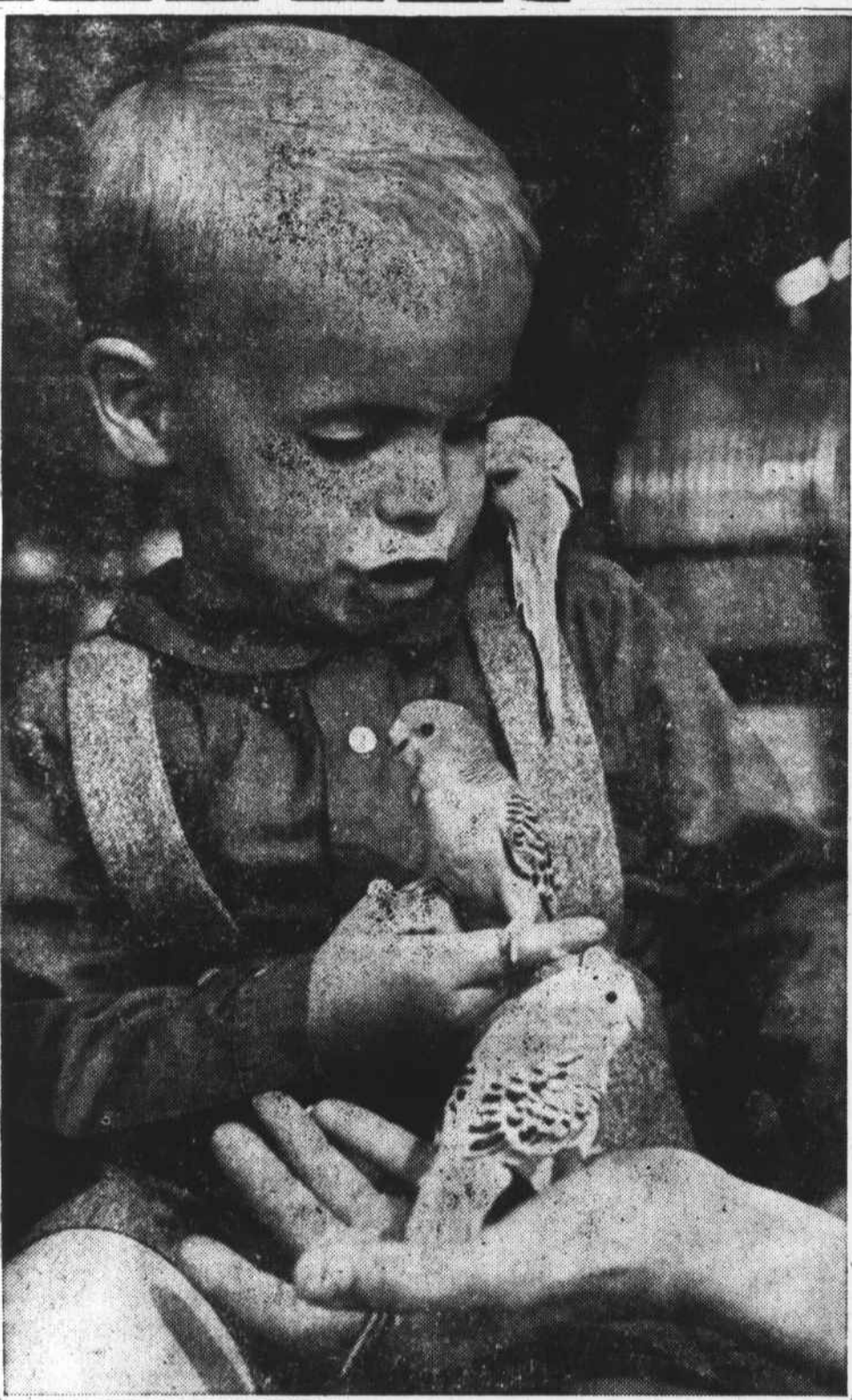
