OFFICIAL biographer for Walt Disney in this county is J. P. Brady; however, maybe J. P. won't mind if I bring up another item in the seemingly inexhaustible supply of stories that have their origin in the period that the movie, "The Great Locomotive Chase", was being made in these parts.

Found out that the eatery is run by Mrs. Don Davis and her husband, Mrs. Davis is a Maconian, coming from Otto, before her marriage, she was Miss Evamae Hyatt. The Davises have run the bus station restaurant in Sylva for six years.

POULTRY IS the biggest money crop in Macon County. Currently, the poultryman is hurting because he can't get enough for his birds or his eggs. I thought Macon folks might be interested in what they're doing down in Chatham County, where poultry is their biggest income, too.

The Chatham people, along with representatives from 12 other counties, asked the government for some sort of control over broiler production. What kind, they didn't specify.
