Clear Creek Man 'Bible Scholar': Rites At Home

HIGHLANDS - George Rufus Talley, 71-year-old native and of the Clear Creek community, died Friday about 1 p. m. at Highlands Community Hospital.

He had been in declining health for a year and had been in the hospital for 24 hours.

Well-known as a church leader in his township, Mr. Talley was a frequent speaker at church events and he often filled pulpits at churches in the area. Although he had no formal education, he was recognized as a "Bible scholar". He was a member of the Clear Creek Baptist Church for 46 years and served for 22 years as superintendent of the Sunday

Funeral services were held Sunday at 2 p. m. at his home by the Rev. Wiley McCall, assisted by the Rev. Eldon Owens. Burial was in the Clear Creek cemetery.

Son of the late William Riley and Mrs. Sarah Ann Galloway Talley, he was married in 1906 to Miss Lona Picklesimer, also of the Clear Creek section. She died in August, 1941.

Surviving Mr. Talley are a daughter, Mrs. Lawrence Bryson, of Highlands; five sons, Arthur, Leroy, and Elmer Talley, all of Highlands, Douglas Talley of Wal-halla, S. C.; a sister, Mrs. Ransom Owens, of Satolah., Ga.; and several grand and great-grandchildren.
