signed as the voting place. This brings to 15 the number of voting precincts in the county.

The actions were taken by the Elections Board at a meeting Saturday morning, held in the courthouse office of the Veterans Service Officer.

Moore's Motion
The motion to break the precinct up into four was made by Fred S. Moore and seconded by Herman Dean, the Republican member of the three-man board. The new registration was ordered on a motion made by Mr. Moore and seconded by Chairman J. Lee Barnard. Mr. Moore moved that the Franklin voting place be moved to the Agricultural Building, with Mr. Dean seconding it. All actions were unanimous.

4,400 Voters
In announcing the decision to break up the Franklin precinct, Chairman Barnard pointed out that it contains approximately 4,400 voters. With that large number, the counting of ballots

sometimes cannot be completed until far into the night — or often the early morning of the day after a general election. Sometimes, too, voters have to stand in line. An objection often voiced to the courtroom as a polling place is the long, steep stairs, difficult for elderly people or persons who are not in good health.

A Wise Move
The division of this precinct would have required a new registration in each of the four new precincts, Mr. Barnard explained; since that was necessary, and since it has been 15 years since there was a new registration, the board felt it would be wise to make it county-wide at this time.

The lines of the present big Franklin precinct have been substantially unchanged for half a century or more, except that, for a short time in the early 1930's, it was split into two, with the people in the southern area voting at the Franklin school. After a single election, Mr. Barnard said, the two areas were reunited into one precinct.

At a session last Thursday night, the chamber board of directors decided the information booth could better serve the interests of the town in a new location. At its present location, the small booth, which opened May 1, is partially obscured from view by the old Munday building, heavily leafed trees, telephone poles, highway signs, and parked cars.
