**RETIRED FARMER —
John S. Pendergrass Dies
Leaving 130 Descendants**

John Sidney Pendergrass, a retired Nantahala farmer and native Maconian, died Saturday, leaving 130 descendants.
Eighty-five years old, he succumbed at the home of a son, Wesley, in the Nantahala section. He had been in declining health for some time.
Surviving are seven sons, five daughters, 70 grandchildren, and 58 great-grandchildren.
Funeral services for Mr. Pendergrass were conducted Tuesday afternoon at the Aquone Baptist Church, of which he was a member. Officiating was the Rev. T. D. Dendy, pastor, and burial was in the church cemetery.
Son of the late John and Mrs. Minnie Dills Pendergrass, he was

married 64 years ago to Miss Mamie Holbrooks, of the Burningtown section, who died several years ago.

Two definite conclusions were drawn: (1) telephone operators are pretty handy to have around, and (2) even under the present set-up, an improved system of handling police calls is needed.
On the latter item, an investigation is being made into the use of a police call box on Main Street with a signal light or an attachment of some kind to signal over the police car radio.

Coming Later
As for solutions when the dial system comes; well, they'll be ironed out at future meetings.
And at least the town won't be rushed.
W. C. T. C. officials previously have said it probably will be 1959 before the present system is replaced by the more modern and problem-producing dial arrangement.

**ALREADY WONDERING —
What Will Police, Firemen
Do When Dial System Comes?**

Though about two years hence, the proposed installation of dial telephones in Franklin already is causing some head-scratching on the part of the town fathers.
Specifically, they're wondering how, without the services of switchboard operators:
(1) Policemen will be summoned, and
(2) Ditto the volunteer firemen.
Under the present operator system, both functions are carried out by the main exchange as a service of the telephone company.
A special buzzer mounted near the courthouse and controlled in the telephone exchange on Main Street alerts the police. From any telephone in town, officers can answer and talk. But, an operator must connect the two parties.

at the telephone exchange and the siren that alerts volunteer firemen over town is controlled there, and firemen get their information about the location of the fire from the exchange.
With Police Chief Sid Carter and Fire Chief A. C. Tysinger sitting in, aldermen hashed over some possible solutions at their monthly meeting last week, but, of course, took no action.

**School Bus
Accident
Is Minor**

No one was hurt in a minor accident involving a partially loaded school bus and a station wagon Tuesday morning about 8:15 on the Lake Emory Road.
The two vehicles were only slightly damaged. Forty pupils were aboard the 60-passenger bus, according to Highway Patrolman H. T. Ferguson, who investigated the accident.
The officer's report said the bus, driven by Charles Donald Young, 18, of Route 4, was struck by a station wagon operated by Ted V. Cabe, 33, of Route 4, in a curve in front of the driveway of the Harry Pangle farm. The bus was traveling toward Franklin.
Damage to the left front fender of the bus was about \$15. Mr. Cabe's station wagon was damaged about \$57 on the left front fender and door.
Patrolman Ferguson has charged Mr. Cabe with having no operator's license and operating his vehicle on the wrong side of the road.
