Pork Loin Gives You Plenty For Your Money

If you're one who wonders how to get the most for your money, then these suggestions from Ruby P. Uzzle, agricultural extension service consumer marketing specialist, should fit your pocketbook and add appeal to your meals.

The pork loin is a top value piece of meat, which extends from the ham to the shoulder. It contains the backbone and upper part of the ribs. The meat consists of thick, tender muscle that runs the entire length of the loin and a smaller muscle, the tenderloin, which extends about one-third of the length from the ham end.

To get three delicious and different meals from one pork loin is as simple as 1, 2, 3. According to Mrs. Uzzle, for these three fresh-cooked pork meals select the more economical rib cut of pork loin. The larger your family the larger the cut you will need.

Here's how you can get these meals:

1. MEATY BARBECUED BACK BONES — Have your meat-mar saw through the ribs high enough to leave an inch-thick layer of meat on the backbones. Ask him to chop these "country-style" backbones into serving size pieces. Cook as spareribs.

2. PORK CHOPS AND GRAVY — Later cut enough chops for another meal from the remaining piece by slicing between the ribs. This is now easy because the backbone has been removed.

3. EASY-TO-SERVE PORK ROAST — You still have a piece left to cook as a pork roast for your third fresh-cooked meal. Be sure to cook pork thoroughly. Use an oven temperature of 325 to 350 degrees and roast about 40 minutes per pound.

Another important development in the Navy's spreading airwing is the first lighter-than-man helicopter powered by dwarf-sized rockets. Belmont View Gazer Ovation, a junior two-year-old, met calving requirements and produced 10,742 pounds of milk and 517 pounds of fat in 305 days. She also was milked twice daily.

The new anti-shoplifting law, passed at the last session of the N. C. General Assembly, is now in force. This new and fair law is for the protection of the public, as well as for the protection of the merchants of our State.

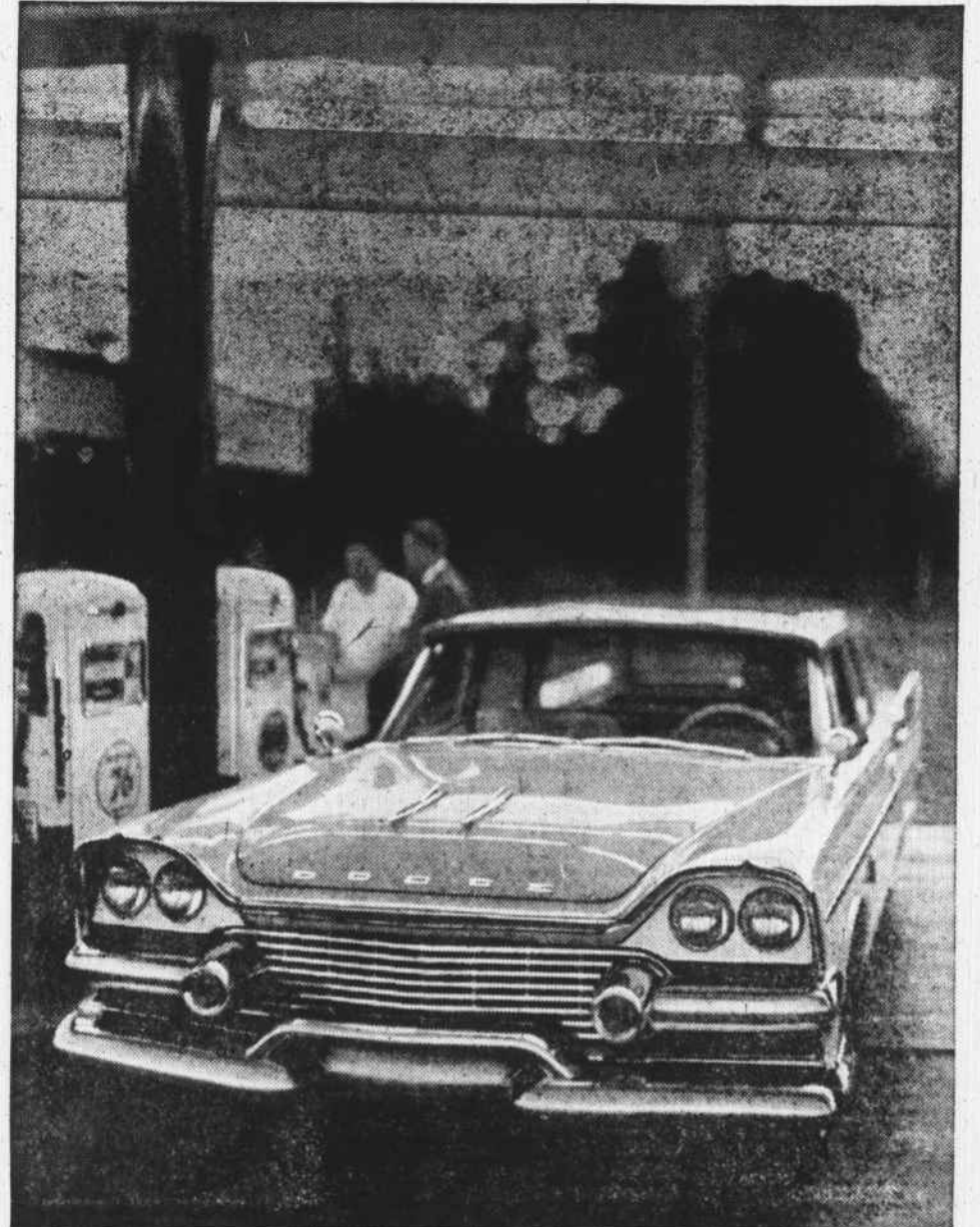
This is the New Law:

Section 1, Chapter 14 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section immediately following G. S. 14-72 to be designated as G. S. 14-72.1, and to read as follows:

"G. S. 14-72.1. Whosoever, without authority, willfully conceals the goods or merchandise of any store, not theretofore purchased by such person, while still upon the premises of such store, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or by imprisonment for not more than six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Such goods or merchandise found concealed upon or about the person and which have not heretofore been purchased by such person shall be Prima Facie evidence of a willful concealment.

"Any person found guilty of a second or subsequent offense of willful concealment of goods as defined in the first paragraph of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished in the discretion of the court."
