4-H club work is most often explained by the traditional slogan. "Learning to do by doing". This can be readily applied to our dairy foods demonstrations.

These demonstrations are of value to two sets of people; the one who gives the demonstration and the one who sees it. It is of value to you who see it because we stress the right way to good health. Everyone knows good health means drinking plenty of good rich milk. Statistics and common knowledge tell us we need at least a quart of milk daily. We dote on that point and show you how to get that amount of milk in your daily diet by various ways. If someone in your family doesn't like to drink milk, we tell you how to camouflage it in custards, ice cream, cottage cheese, pies and/or milk drinks. There are dozen of ways you can put milk in your meals and I am sure that seeing a demonstration would be a lot more interesting way to learn than trying to find them in


