C. C. Humphreys, Summer Resident, Dies In Florida

Chester Charles Humphreys, of Tampa, Fla., who purchased the Wellman Lodge at Cullasaja about five years ago, died May 19 in Tampa of a cerebral hemorrhage.

Sixty-eight, he spent his summers for many years in North Carolina. Mr. Humphreys had retired last year after "most 17 years' service as deputy installation engineer at MacDill Air Force Base.

A native of Irontown, Ohio, he went to Tampa in 1925 to supervise construction, organization, and operation of the city's waterworks. He organized his own business in 1933, and in 1936 entered government service as chief engineer with the Public Works Administration in Tampa. He assumed his job at MacDill in 1940.

Mr. Humphreys is survived by his wife, Mrs. Marion E. Humphreys, and a son, Charles H., both of Tampa, and two sisters, Miss Addie H. Humphreys and Miss Bert H. Humphreys, of Los Angeles, Calif.
