'Magic' Milk May Improve Drinking Habits

"Too few 'Tar Heels' drink the recommended three or four glasses of milk daily," reports Miss S. Virginia Wilson, N. C. Agricultural Extension Service nutrition specialist.

According to statewide studies made in 1957 of over 1500 home demonstration club members, only 43.3 per cent of the women, 53.8 per cent of the men, and 49.6 per cent of the children under 20 years of age consume more than two glasses of milk per day.

A "magic" milk concentrate made up of dry, whole milk flakes that keep indefinitely on the kitchen cupboard shelf and, when added to water, will instantly retransform into pure, fresh-tasting whole milk, has been a key part of research carried on by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and other scientists.

This is a product which has long been sought by the dairy industry. When the product is perfected, USDA scientists say, it will match the high-quality non-fat dry milk now available.

Miss Wilson believes this milk concentrate which is promised for the near future, will enable homemakers to keep quality milk on hand at all times. This, she feels, could boost the milk drinking habits of many N. C. families.

Common Rat, Economic Pest, Can Be Stopped

The common rat has lived with man for so long until some people are ready to take him for granted.

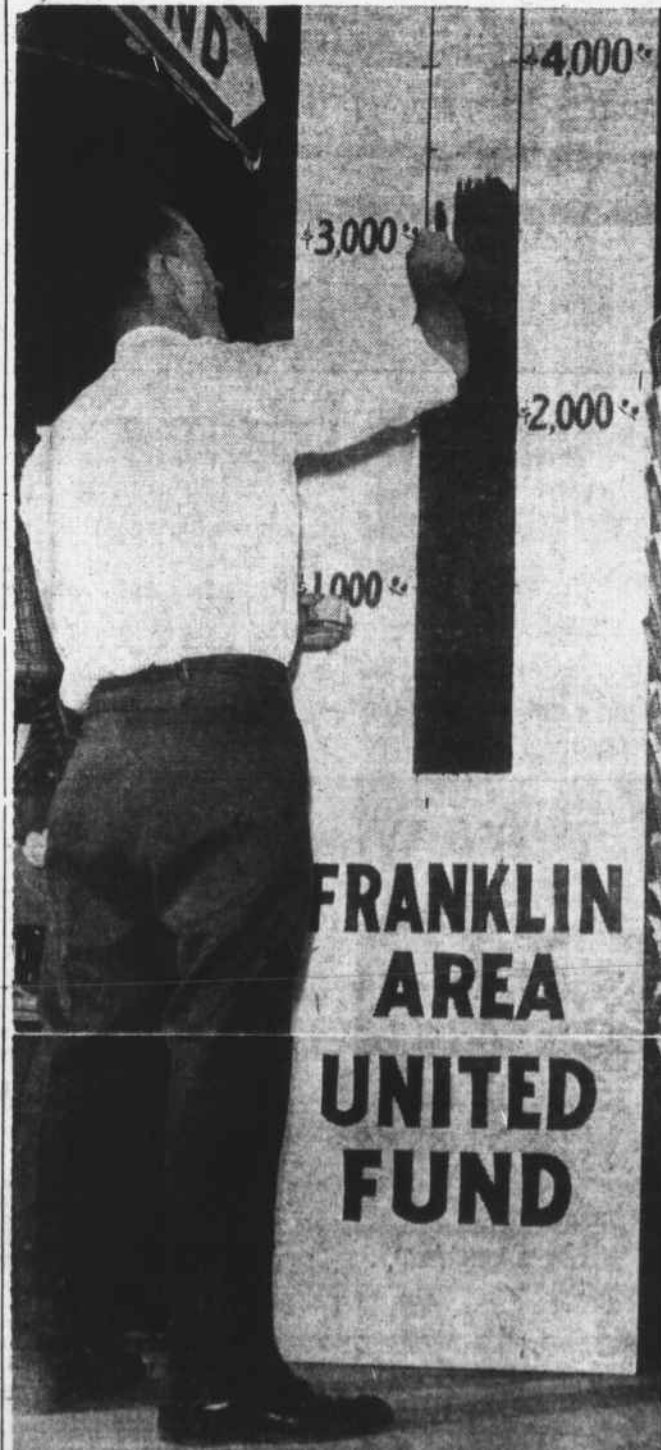
But rats do not have to be taken for granted, according to Joe Lindsey, district agent for the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. They can be eliminated.

"Each of us must accept responsibility for the rats we have on our premises," Mr. Lindsey said, "because we raise a good crop of rats for the same reasons we raise good hogs, cows or chickens."

"Rats, like these other animals, must have a sheltered place to raise their young. They must be protected from their natural enemies. They must have food and water."

To prevent having a good crop of rats, Mr. Lindsey says a farmer must eliminate the things that will provide rats a good home. After making life difficult for the rats, there will usually be some that must be killed. County farm agents will gladly supply information on the best way to do this.
