A. C. Moore left the first of this week for Niagara Falls, N. Y., where he will be employed.

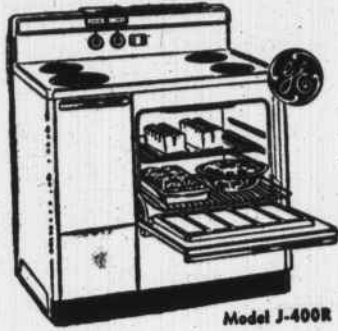
