School children apparently are making up for the week they lost when the opening of the pool was delayed because of well repairs under way on the town water system.

Meanwhile, as swimmers frolic, activity on the golf course is picking up. In spite of the weather over the week end, golfers were numerous.

All nine holes of the course now have grass greens, replacing sand ones. Developing the grass greens has been underway for two years.

"Another two weeks and all of the greens should be in perfect condition," according to T. W. Angel, Jr., one of the owners.

There is talk of at least two golf tournaments at the course this season, one for junior golfers and one for adults.

"We're ready to cooperate fully with the organizations wanting to stage the tournaments," Mr. Angel said.

grounds has been moved and re-modeled, placing it more in the center of activity. Roads also have been widened and some new ones cut.

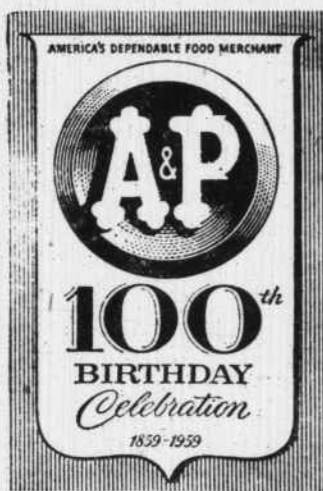
