Local Sailors Take Part In California Review And Visit

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. (FHT-NC) — Charles P. Gregory, machinist's mate second class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Parker Gregory, of Route 4, Franklin, N. C., serving aboard the store ship USS Regulus, and Thomas R. Turpin, chief hospital corpsman, USN, son of Mrs. Belle B. Turpin, of Franklin, serving aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Hancock, took part in a full-scale naval review and visit to San Francisco, Calif., July 17-20, after completing a major exercise held off the California coast.

The 15,000 men and 26 ships of the U.S. First Fleet were reviewed by Admiral Herbert G. Hopwood, USN, the commander-

in-chief of the U.S. Pacific Fleet, as they passed under the Golden Gate bridge. The exercise, which preceded the San Francisco visit, involved fast-moving aggressive attack carrier teams which struck at simulated mainland targets as naval air patrol squadrons and submarine marines held the defensive roll.

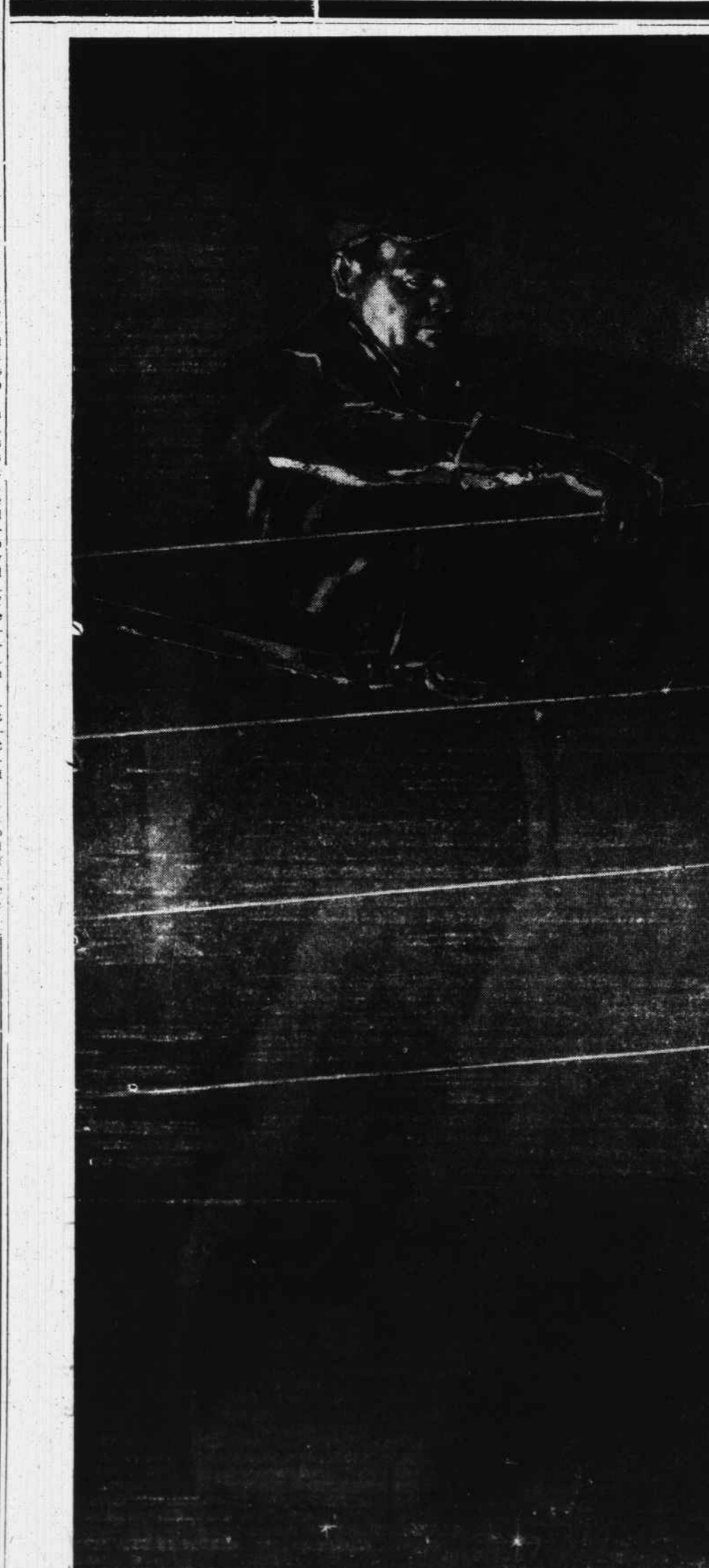
