MACON PARTICIPANTS — Western Carolina Summer School Plans Revealed

CULLOWHEE — Dr. M. B. Morrill, director of the summer demonstration school at Western Carolina College, has announced plans for the coming term, which opens June 13 and closes July 13. Two from the Macon County School System have been selected for the faculty and a number of pupils from here will be enrolled. The school was founded 13 years ago as just one class, needed to provide observations opportunities for in-service teachers who were taking summer courses in education. This remains the basic pur-

pose of the school, although it has grown in size and scope to cover a much broader field of activity, including limited student teaching. Dr. Morrill said the demonstration school contains three areas of concentration, the largest of which is devoted to the normal child. In this area, the school provides enrichment features not usually possible in a regular classroom, and each child enrolls in the grade which he has just completed in his own school. It is not intended that any child shall be allowed to skip a grade, but may be used as make-up credit if an individual child's home school principal requests it.

Those enrolled in this program commute via school bus from Jackson, Haywood, Swain, and Macon counties.

The second phase of the demonstration school work is prepared for handicapped or retarded children. In this case, children will live in dormitories and at least one parent will be enrolled in special education courses at the college. While the children are in classes with specially trained teachers, the parents are attending college classes where they receive instruction and training in specialized care for their children.

In such cases, enrollment is necessarily limited for lack of dormitory space. The most recent addition to the summer program is the special education for academically talented children which is under the general supervision of Dr. C. D. Killian. Children are selected for attendance in these classes on the basis of superior achievement in their own schools, superior academic ability, and social and emotional maturity. They live in dormitories with counselors and supervisors trained in this work.

A special class in Spanish will be taught at the fourth grade level. Those enrolled for this class will also commute from the surrounding area. Dr. Morrill said the normal curriculum of the demonstration school will permit enrollment of children from first grade through certain areas of high school work. Teachers for this school are chosen from schools throughout North Carolina, and some from other states, on the basis of outstanding contributions they have

made in their own fields. This year's faculty will include: Mrs. Elizabeth Cabe Guffey, of Franklin, and Mrs. Mary K. Morrow, of Newton-Carver, primary grades; Miss Lois Carver, of Mecklenburg County Schools, and Mrs. Mildred Martin, of Asheville, fourth and fifth; Mrs. Hilda Duckett, of Asheville, sixth, seventh, and eighth; David H. Cherman, of Opa Locka, Florida, high school English; James P. Holt, Spartanburg, South Carolina, mathematics; Samuel E. Thomason, of Greenville, S. C., science; Miss Nell Stinson, of Raleigh, social studies.

In special areas, Miss Julia Woodson, of Burlington, will have charge of primary pupils. Mrs. Ruth Smith, of Forsythe County Schools, will conduct the work in remedial reading, and Charles S. Graham, of Wilson, will work in speech correction.

Teachers for the gifted children will be: Mrs. Mary M. Waring, Hendersonville, fifth; Don Hayes, Winston-Salem, sixth; Sam Haywood, Mecklenburg County

Schools, seventh. Professor Frank J. S. Maturio, of the college faculty, will teach the fourth grade Spanish. Mrs. C. A. Hoyle is director of student teaching.

ABOUT YOUR Social Security

Protection against loss of income because of retirement, death, or disability is available to farmers since 1955 under the Social Security Law. A farmer obtains Social Security credits if his net earnings are at least \$400 a year. If his net earnings are less than this amount he may elect to file under the optional method, if his gross is at least \$600.

Farmers must file an income tax return and a Schedule "F" each year that their net is \$400 or more, or if they choose the optional method of reporting. Filing an income tax return does not mean that you must pay federal income tax. Payment of income tax is dependent upon your earnings status. However, a self-employment tax must be paid on your farm earnings of \$400 or more, or the amount determined by the optional method of reporting.

Share farmers and tenant farmers, as well as farm operators and materially participating landlords,

are defined as farmers and subject to the same self-employment taxes.

The income shown on your Schedule "F" must be based on records of your sales and expenses. Your net income is derived by subtracting your farm expenses from your farm gross income. Farm gross, for example, would be the sale price of your tobacco, and your net earnings would be the sale price of the crop, less expenses, such as fertilizer, seed, farm taxes, truck expenses, depreciation of equipment or buildings, etc.

As a farmer you have the responsibility of keeping your records and filing your tax returns when they are due. Social Security offers you and your family financial protection. Protect yourself and your family! File your tax returns in accordance with the law and feel secure in your future.

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The COOKING CORNER Favorite Recipes Of MACON WOMEN

DATE-NUT SQUARES

- 1 cup butter
- 4 cups brown sugar
- 4 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 3 cups flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup nuts, chopped
- 1 cup dates, chopped

Combine butter and sugar, and cook until smooth in heavy sauce pan. Cool. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla, dry ingredients, nuts and dates. Spread about 1 inch thick in pan and bake about 30 minutes, or until brown, at 350 degrees F. Cut in squares while warm.
