

WEATHER FAILS TO BLUFF OUT APPEARANCE OF LITTLE SYMPHONY

An inch and half of snow Saturday delayed the morning concert of the N. C. Little Symphony in Franklin, but true to tradition the show went on. The morning children's concert was rescheduled for after lunch and the adult concert that night went off without a hitch. Several thousand children heard (picture above) the symphony under the direction of Dr. Benjamin Swalin. About 450 turned out for the night concert in the high school gymnasium. Replacing tenor soloist Walter Carringer, who had to return to New York when the orches-

tra canceled earlier concerts in the western area because of the weather, was Miss Sophia Steffan, mezzo-soprano of High Point and New York. The guest soloist began her career with Grass Roots Opera Company in the role of Carmen. She studied at Mannes School, appeared with the Aspen Music Festival, Lyric Opera of Chicago, New Orleans Opera Association, Julliard Opera Theatre, New York City Opera, and others. In 1959, Miss Steffan won the Naumburg Foundation award, which gave her a recital in Town Hall in New York City.

Persons planning to donate to the building fund are requested to do it immediately so construction can begin as soon as the weather permits. The association earlier said it hoped to have enough on hand by the 29th of this month to begin the project. Plans call for a 132 by 48 foot block hall.

If the money for the main exhibit hall is raised by the public, an anonymous citizen has promised to erect a cattle barn on the fair grounds.

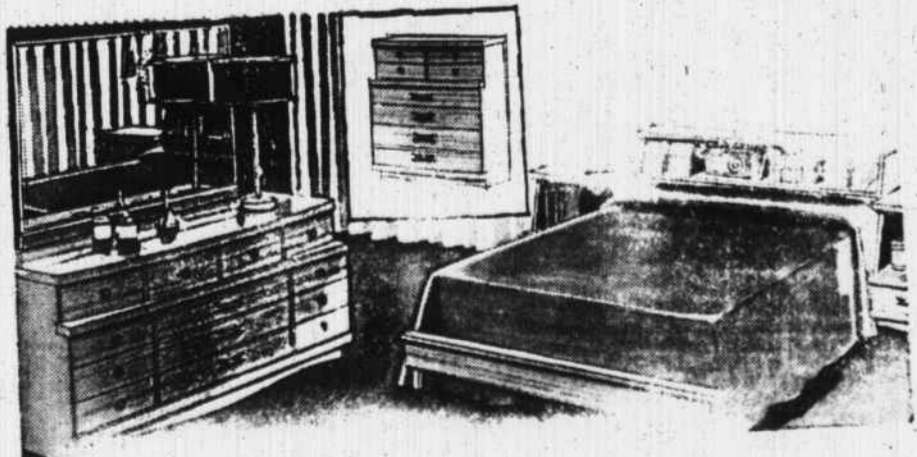
