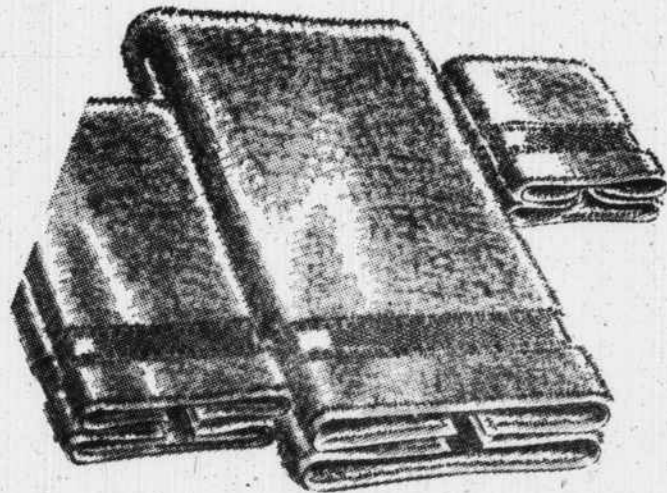

Following the wedding rehearsal Friday night, a cake cutting was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harley Carpenter, Jr.



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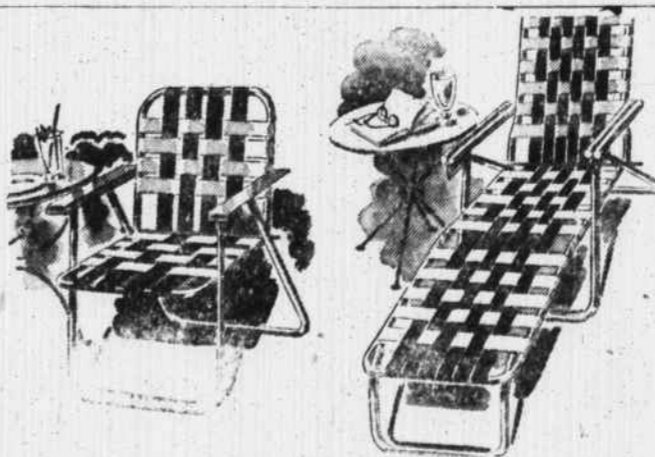
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
