LETTER FROM LINDA -

This is a letter from the American Field Service student in Bel

The SS GROOTE BEER left the harbor of Hoboken, New Jersey, at noon on July 26. The passenger list composed almost enabout 150 Europeans returning home after a year in the United States. The voyage was wonder ful, although there was some rain during two days. The Americans spent much time studying French and Flemish and talking with the returnees about life in Europe.

The boat docked in Rotterdam. good-byes to our new friends That same day we 10 Americans went to Brussels, Belgium, by train. There we had temporary quarters at the Paul Heger University. The next three weeks passed quickly with sightseeing trips, language lessons, orientation, and shopping expeditions in downtown Brussels. During this time we also had several short visits with our new
