With the 1960 Agricultural Conservation Program closing in just a few more weeks, farmers who are interested in fall conservation practices should check by the local office, 1463 farmers have participated up to this week. Assistance is now being given for lime to be used on old pasture or hay, and also on land to be seeded next spring. Cost-sharing is also being given on fertilizer to improve the stand of grass and clover. The money remaining in the pool at this time will be used on a come-first serve basis.

The 1960 burley tobacco marketing cards have been prepared and mailed to Macon burley producers. The farmers have certain responsibilities concerning the marketing card. The main thing is the card is property of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and must be returned to the county A.S.C. office as soon as sales have been completed for the year. The marketing card should not be left in the possession of the buyer. The card must be used to identify Dills.
