Why is it that people think newspapermen never work? A case in point: "Don't you ever work?" This remark is tossed my way at the very least a half dozen times a day by any number of people. And when I try to explain, they generally answer: "Well, I see you all over town just walking around."

I'm willing to admit that I'm not a ball of fire when it comes to working, but when I'm "just walking around" it isn't loafing in the sense that I'm doing absolutely nothing.

Consider this a minute and you'll see what I'm driving at: How in the name of common sense can a news reporter gather news sitting in the office? How else is he (or she) going to learn anything staring at the blank walls or tapping out "now is the time for all good men to come to the aid of their party" on the typewriter?

You see? A reporter has to "just walk around" in order to pick up news from a variety of sources. News, believe me, doesn't walk in and put itself in the typewriter. You have to go out and get it.

It's quite natural for me to be seen "all over town" because NEWS is where people are, and people are all over town. There're any number of stories appearing each week in The Press that require talking with several people, all of whom live or work in different parts of town.

Also, it should be remembered, PEOPLE MAKE NEWS and a reporter — to do his job reasonably well — should go out of his (or her) way to meet and talk to them.

Sgt. Campbell Sent To Korea For 13 Months

KUNSAN, KOREA — Staff Sergeant Clinton E. Campbell, husband of Mrs. Patricia J. Campbell, of Route 3, Franklin, N. C., has arrived at Kunsan to serve a 13-month tour with the United States Air Force.

He has been assigned to the 6175th Support Squadron in the Base Operations Section. Before coming to Korea, he was stationed at Donaldson Air Force Base, Greenville, S. C.

Kunsan Air Base, located on the Yellow Sea coast approximately 120 miles south of the 38th parallel, which divides North and South Korea, is reported to get as many as a dozen tips for stories; maybe someone is going out of town; to visit, or represent an organization, or someone else may have just heard someone else tell about passing a wreck out on the highway.

A tip or rumor more often than not develops into a newspaper's best story of the week. And it's people who pass these tips along. The funny thing is, most of the time they aren't conscious of doing it. I frequently, in greeting, will negatively ask, "what's new?" or "What do you know?"

And they'll usually answer: "Not a thing... the town's drying up."

But then, as we talk, the tips start bobbing up — two, three, maybe more.

And while I'm "just walking around" I try to check them out. Contrary to what you might think, ALL NEWS that goes into the paper is verified and sometimes rechecked, before it is printed.

Rumor is verified as fact before appearing in print. And that frequently is harder to do than one might think. Human beings have a way of not wanting adverse things printed — that is unless it's on someone else!

And just for the record, all that "walking around" during the day generally means a reporter is pounding out his stories at night when most of you are relaxing at the television, or conjuring up pleasant dreams.

So you see, even when I'm quaffing a soothing cup of coffee (and I do love my coffee), "just walking around," or holding up a parking meter on the main drag there is some suggestion of work going on inside me. If it wasn't I wouldn't be in the business!

And while I'm waxing journalistically here, I'd like to ask one favor of the public.

Don't assume that the newspaper knows about some happening. None of us are clairvoyant or own crystal balls; we're just human beings doing a job like everyone else.

A tip or telephone call about something taking place is always welcome.

And in the long run, it helps everyone by assuring a complete newspaper with plenty of news.
