WASTING GOOD MONEY

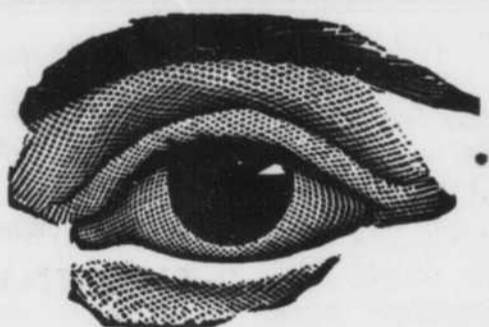
It's pretty hard to convince a VASS merchant that he had better drop his money down in the well than pass it over to a fly-by-night advertising solicitor, the smooth guy who drops in with a publicity scheme that isn't worth a minute of time or a cent of money. It takes some people a good while to learn that the same money spent in a newspaper would bring infinitely better returns.

This country is filled to the brim with smooth young men who do nothing but think up publicity schemes. Once they have framed a catchy one they beat it to the smaller towns to "unload" on the merchant who believes that any kind of advertising is good advertising, and who thinks that novelties and time cards and stock booklets with his name upon them are actually business getters. These young men don't play their trade so much in the large cities, because there is usually a Commercial Club or a Broad of Trade ruling against just the sort of thing they seek to dispose of. But in towns where every merchant has to think out his own plan of advertising, and where he hasn't tried to understand the inside workings of these fly-by-night schemes, the waste of good money goes right on. And the funniest part of it is that the merchant who bites usually pays cash in advance and takes the smooth young stranger's word for it that he is going to get more than his money's worth.

We are strong for every kind of advertising that will pay the man who advertises. But we detest fakes. That's why we spend a good deal of time regretting that some merchants can't see that which successful merchants long ago learned—that of all forms of advertising known to man—nothing has yet been found as good as space in the home paper.

And yet a lot of people who long for the good old days would hate to have to hitch up just to ride around the corner.

SAVE THE TOMATO

Canned Tomatoes

Pick tomatoes from vine when beginning to turn red on shelves in shade until ripe.

Select only ripe tomatoes. Any fruit less well colored be used for soup mixture or One green or light color will ruin the grade of the

Blanch for one minute. will slip off easily. Do not more than may be immediately, as tomatoes ferment.

Be careful to remove with knife the hard part of tomato

Put into cans as many tomatoes as possible, cutting when they are too large to fill can to within 1-4 inch press gently and shake down fill crevices.

A level teaspoonful of sugar level teaspoonful of salt to can or a quart jar of tomatoes prove the flavor of the product should be added when can is

Use no water with tomatoes the can is properly filled the be sufficient. A No. 3 can totes when filled should 1 ounce.

Exhaust No. 3 tin cans 2 seal; process 22 minutes.

When canning tomatoes jars, fill quite full and process jars 30 minutes.

Soup Mixture

Five quarts tomatoes, corn; 2 quarts okra or lima tablespoonfuls sugar (level spoonfuls salt (level). Seal tomatoes, cutting out green spots. Chop and measure.

and tender field or sugar cob. Slice okra in rings thick. Peel and quarter Place all in open agate kettle until thick. Pour in No. 2 hot, seal, and process 1 hour a No. 3 can 1 1-2 hours

Always use an asbestos kettle when boiling soup. It is very easily scorched.

When canning soup mixture jars, process quart jars 1 hour. Process pint jars 1 hour.

Tomato Ketchup

Select only ripe tomatoes up; wash, but do not peel green cores and bad places measure, and place on stove top porcelain-lined or agate For every gallon of tomatoes level cup of finely chopped Boil until both tomato and soft. Strain juice and pulp a coarse wire sieve, mashing all the pulp possible. Measure strained pulp and juice as in the following recipe:

2 gallons strained mixture and onions, 2 1-2 level to ground cloves, 3 level to ground ginger, 2 level to ground red pepper, 3 level to fuls ground allspice, 1 level spoonful ground black pepper level cup (1-2 pint cup) level cup (1-2 pint cup) salt vinegar.

Place strained tomatoes in vessel; add spices, sugar boil until thick; add hot water let boil 30 minutes before to bottle mixture.
