Farmers who are interested in mak Farmers who are interested in mak-
ng greater yields and more profitabe crops of oats and other smail
grains can do so by applying nitrate of soda as a top dressing, say exten. sion workers of the State College and Department of Agriculture.
According to Mr. W. F. Pate of the Division of Agronomy this application of nitrate of soda should be made during March or at that time when
the ground begins to warm up and the the ground begins to warm up and the grain begins to grow. Mr. Pate says that the soda should be used at the
rate of about 100 pounds per acre and broadcasted by hand in the afternoon or when the oats and wheat are not wet with dew or rain to pre-
