The organized growers of Caswell county on the same day at their county meeting in Yanceyville registered their protest against the practice of landlords who are members of the marketing association allowing tobacco which is under contract to the association to be marketed by non-member growers.

A sweeping victory was won by the tobacco association in Virginia this week when three cases came up for trial before Judge W. R. Barksdale at Halifax court house.

Two other defendants whose cases came up this week in the Halifax court agreed to all the terms of the suit brought against them rather than try their cases.

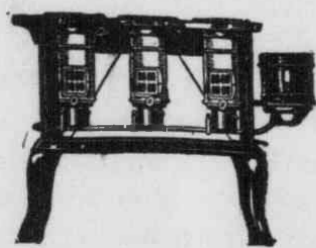
