Communities that work for and vote for and agitate and actually show a determination to lift themselves out of the mud are getting federal aid. Those content to drag along with poorly patched up highways are going to be the last in the country to get that greatest of all blessings to a community—good and modern highways.

Don't lose courage. Get started agitating for better roads. Get your neighbor interested. And pretty soon you'll interest Uncle Sam to the extent that he'll dig down in his pocket to help you build them.
