

INCREASE IN **INSURANCE COSTS**

Mason and Gardner Explain **Cause For New** Rate

A communication from The Mason & Gardner company., Pinehurst, explains the 25 percent increase in Fire Insurance rates on Mercantile or Commercial property, not of fire resistive construction, which became effective on May 15, last. This increase appears to be justified by figures showing the actual experience of fire insurance writing companies in North Carolina, which prove that the companies were placed in the position of either having to decline to write this class of business or increase the rates; they resorted to the latter alternative.

During the five year period between 1921 and 1925 the ratio of losses incurred to premiums earned was 61.2 percent; add to this the expenses incurred, amounting to 43.21 percent, gives a total of 104.41 percent, which means that for every dollar of premium earned they have paid out one dollar and four cents in losses and expenses. The rate increase of percent on mercantile risks, which has been th source of the greatest losses, it is estimated will increase the net earned premiums five percent, which will about offset the net loss. This rate increase does not effect residen-
