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and North Carolina, 2,190,894. But North Carolina has more bearing trees than either Michigan or New Jersey. That accounts for the greater production.

California makes a cling peach that is used largely for canning. When packed in stiff syrup it affords a peach that holds up firm and takes up the syrup and makes a table confection that has a wide popularity. As a peach to eat raw it has not so much to recommend it, and the individual who is familiar with the Georgia Belle or the Elberta cares little for the California type. The Georgia Belle is probably the best peach grown, but it is not so good a shipper and therefore does not get into the market in quantities enough to permit it to be properly appreciated. But the Elberta is a keeper and shipper and a handsome fruit, even though it is hardly so delicate in its flavor as the Belle type of peaches, and the Elberta has the market. It is a good canner, good to eat, fine in appearance, large in size, brilliant in color, and ripens evenly all the way around. It constitutes the great majority of the trees of North Carolina. In the Sandhills, where 97 percent of all the trees are reported, half of all the trees are Elbertas, and half of the remainder are Georgia Belles. About forty other varieties are planted, but not enough of anything else to give prominence to any of them. Hileys and Hales account for less than 10 percent each, with the Hale growing in favor as it ripens later than the other, and brings a fairly good price. But while it is a fair peach it is not so good a cropper as the Elberta. It is strongly showing a tendency to drive out of the market all but the Elberta and the Belle as far as this section is concerned.
