PINEHURST AYRSHIRE HERD HIGHEST PRODUCERS IN U. S. DURING DECEMBER

The highest average yield recorded in December for a herd of seventy cows, was 649 pounds of 4.01 per cent milk, 26.00 pounds of butterfat, secured by the Pinehurst Farm Ayrshires, located at Pinehurst, North Carolina, tested according to the rules of the Ayrshire Herd Test, reports Advanced Registry Superintendent W. A. Kyle of the National Ayrshire Breeders' Association, at Brandon, Vermont. The following cows in the herd produced in excess of sixty pounds of butterfat for the month.
