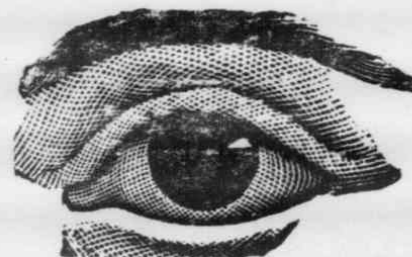

The enormous increase in the use of checks, drafts, acceptances and other paper instruments in lieu of cash in the past few years has greatly facilitated business transactions and without them it would be impossible to carry on commerce and industry on the immense scale that now prevails.

But like all beneficial innovations their use has been accompanied by abuse.

Some of this abuse arises from ignorance and reprehensible indifference on the part of the makers of such instruments, but much of it has its origin in sheer viciousness.

The overdrawing of bank accounts, for instance has reached a point where it is the cause of a tremendous economic loss. Millions of checks are returned to the makers every day by banks in this country alone, and the expense of handling them is a serious waste of the country's resources.

Disregarding the cost of printing and binding check books clerical work and other expense entailed in clearing checks, it costs a bank an average of three cents for every one it handles when it is properly drawn and promptly paid. But when one is returned on account of "insufficient funds" this cost is more than doubled and if protested the expense is increased many hundred per cent.

We hear much of the fire loss in this country and its effect on the welfare of its citizens, but a large part of this is unavoidable, while the waste resulting from the passing of bad checks goes on almost unnoticed and is easily preventable by the mere application of a little care and forethought and the reasonable consideration of the rights and welfare of others by the makers.

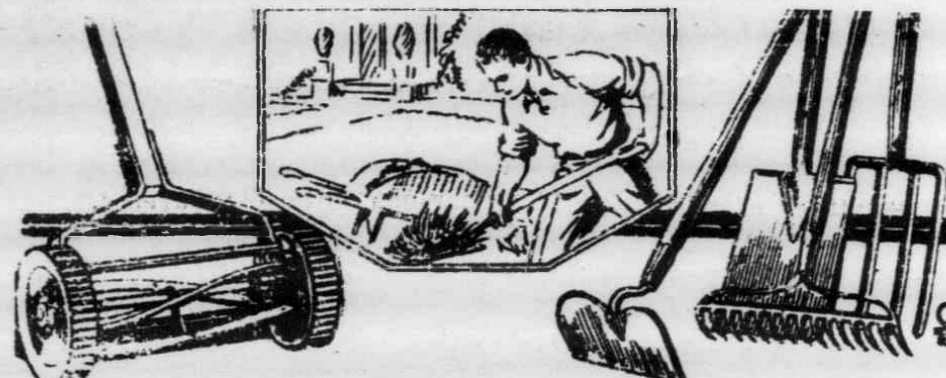

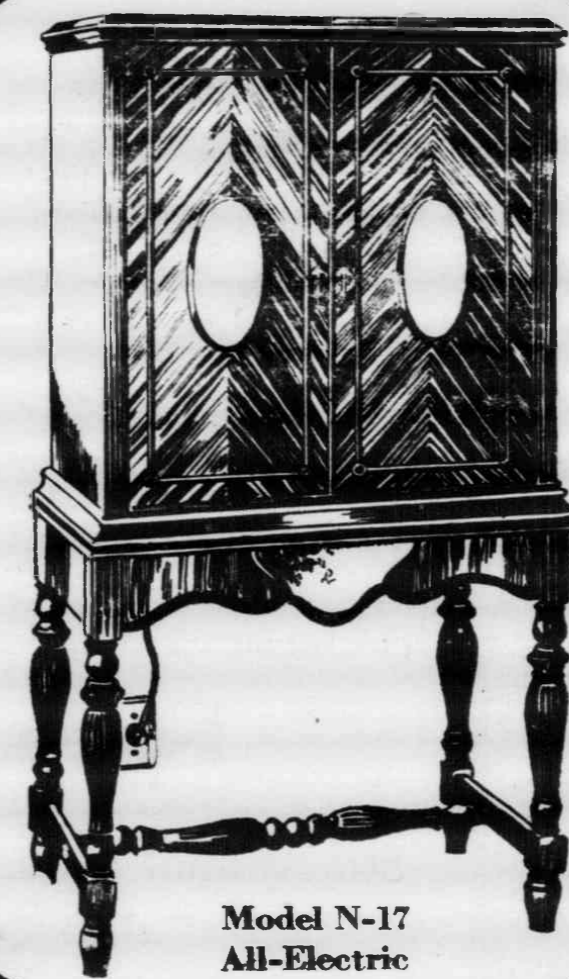
