

Many Prizes Offered Pupils Here For Proficiency in Their Studies

Generous Contributions Made by Those Interested in Schools To Stimulate Scholarship

Aberdeen students have something to work for besides honor and glory this year. Many prizes have been offered by persons interested in the schools here, to be presented at the end of the school year. The complete list is as follows:

1. Gold medal given by Masonic Order for exemplary citizenship, to be awarded to a Senior.
2. Medal given by the D. A. R. for highest average in American History. This is to be awarded to a member of the eleventh grade.
3. Science prize given by G. C. Seymour, to be awarded for highest average in Science classes.
4. English prize, given by the Book Club for highest average in year's work. Students in all English classes in High School are eligible.
5. Mathematics prize, given by Page Trust Company for outstanding work in mathematics. Only members of the tenth grade who have taken three years in this course are eligible.
6. Latin medal, given by Dr. A. H. McLeod, as a memorial to his mother, to be awarded for highest average. Students in all Latin classes are eligible.
7. French prize given by Mrs. M. F. Butner for highest average. Students in both French classes are eligible.
- 8-9. Recitation and declamation prizes (\$10.00 gold pieces) given by a friend of the school as a memorial to Allison Martin Page, and Thomas Banner Wilder, Jr.
10. Music medal given by Mr. and Mrs. Hardin Gunter for greatest improvement in music during the year.
11. Music prize given by Miss White for the pupil making the next best improvement.
- 12-13. Domestic science prizes given by the Stay-A-While Club of Aberdeen for excellence. One will be given in each of the two domestic science classes.
14. A prize for excellence in Literary Society work given by Dr. F. O. Bell to be awarded to a member of the O. Henry Literary Society.
15. Prize for excellence in society to be given to a member of the McIver Literary Society by Dr. H. E. Bowman.

1. Prizes for highest average in Primary department including three years' work. One for a boy and one for a girl in the third grade.
2. Prizes for highest average in Grammar grades, including four years' work. One for a boy and one for a girl in the third grade.

4. Prizes for highest average made in the entire period for four years' high school work. One will be presented to a young lady and a young man in the Senior class.

State Gets Nearly Two Millions From U. S. For Highways

Federal Aid for Road Construction Announced by Secretary of Agriculture

PROGRAM IS SPEEDED UP

North Carolina has been apportioned \$1,722,673 of the \$73,126,000 authorized by Congress as Federal aid for road construction work in the fiscal year 1931, Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde announced in Washington. The apportionments by Mr. Hyde were a response to President Hoover's suggestion that public building programs be speeded up and prudently expanded to promote business and prevent unemployment.

The secretary announced that the State highway departments will be authorized to proceed immediately with preparations for the expenditure of the newly apportioned funds during the next construction season.

Texas was awarded \$1,545,830, the largest allotment of any of the States, while New York came next with \$3,605,965. Four states, Delaware, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont, and Hawaii tied for the lowest allotment with each one apportioned \$365,625.

For work during the winter, where weather conditions will permit, and in the spring and early summer throughout the country, Secretary Hyde said there is available a balance of \$28,000,000 of the federal-aid funds previously apportioned, making a total of \$101,125,000 with which the federal government is prepared to match at least an equal amount of State money for expenditure on Federal-aid roads during the calendar year 1930.

The Federal fund is apportioned among all states and Hawaii in proportion to their respective areas, populations and mileage of post roads, and the share of each State is available for expenditure on roads included in the Federal-aid system under the joint supervision of the State highway department and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads.
