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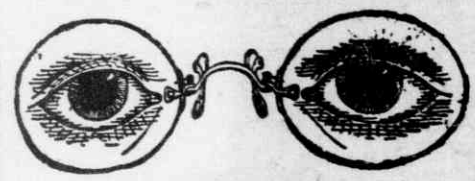

be provided with clothing and sufficient food for one week. He reported the purchase from money donated by people of the county of 300 pairs of shoes, 300 union suits, 180 sweaters for children, men's underwear, boys' pants and shirts, girl's dresses, hose for all ages; the preparation for distribution of the many overcoats, suits of clothes, sweaters, shirts, shoes, underwear and other garments given to the committee, and the purchase of flour, meal, lard, meat, butter, sugar, grits, coffee, oranges, milk, apples and candy. The groceries were purchased at cost from Bakers' Food Store in Southern Pines through the generosity of the management, which also donated \$20 toward the cause. Mr. Buchan reported. He also expressed thanks to the Civic Club of Southern Pines, the Good Fellows' Club, of Aberdeen and others who have ably assisted the committee in its plans for relief and spread of Christmas cheer where they are most needed. He told of one man, paralyzed through a recent accident, penniless and with ten children ranging in ages from 1 to 13, to whom the committee has sent a bountiful supply of clothing and food. Paul Dana reported to the meeting a donation of \$50 from the Sandhill Post of the American Legion.

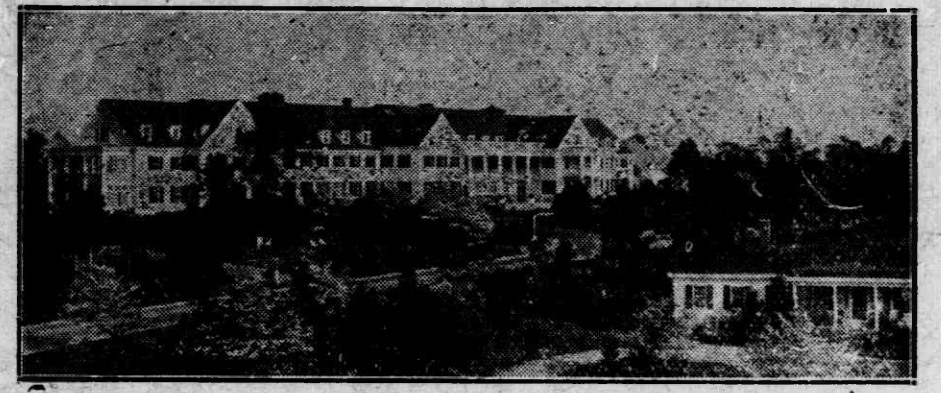
Pines, and by Kwanians in Aberdeen and Pinehurst.

SENATOR OVERMAN DIES, CAM MORRISON NAMED

Lee S. Overman of North Carolina, second ranking member of the upper house of Congress, Senator from North Carolina since March 4, 1903, died early last Friday morning in Washington after a brief illness. Senator Overman was born January 3, 1864 in Salisbury, and resided there throughout his lifetime. He succeeded the late Jeter C. Pritchard, Republican, in the United States Senate, and only his colleague, Senator F. M. Simmons of this state, had served longer than he in that body. Mrs. Overman and three daughters survive.

Governor Gardner appointed former Governor Cameron Morrison to the seat vacated by Mr. Overman's death, and Senator Morrison was sworn in at the Capitol early this week.

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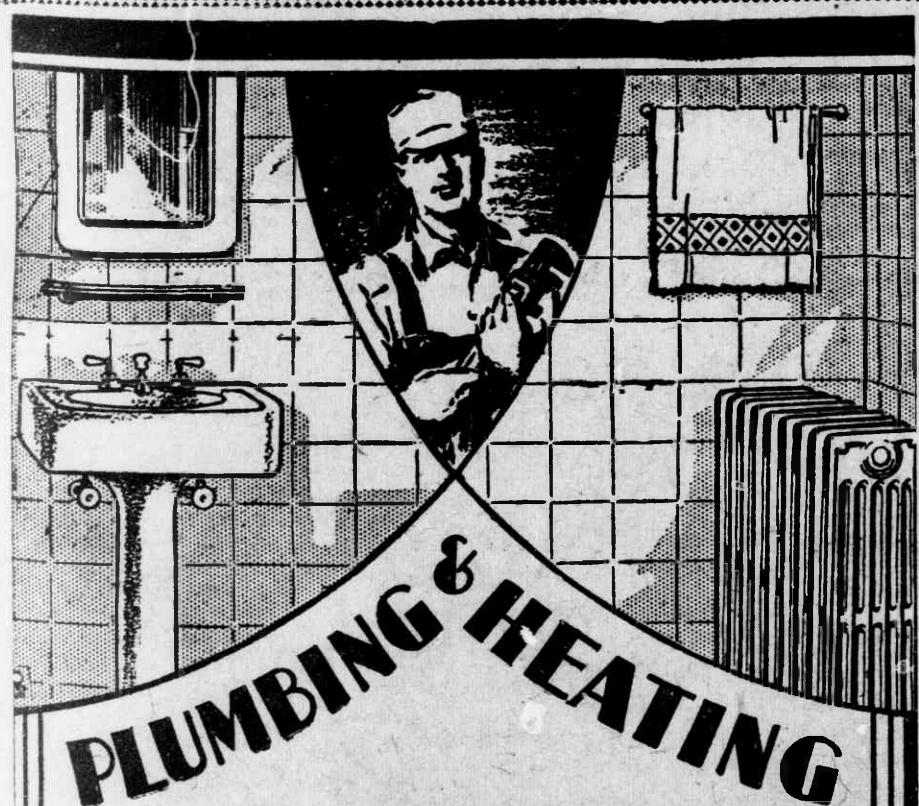
