Mr. Crawshaw, who would have reached his seventy-fifth birthday in August, was born in Jefferson, New Hampshire and came to Southern Pines in 1910, becoming proprietor of Oak Hall during the seasons of 1911-12, 1912-13, then assuming charge of the many interests of J. C. Stanley.

Mrs. Crawshaw, a sister of Mrs. J. L. Pottle, died four years ago leaving as Mr. Crawshaw's nearest relative, a nephew, J. L. Bacon of Jefferson, who was here during Mr. Crawshaw's illness and returned with the casket Saturday night. Funeral services were held in Jefferson.
