W. M. Wooten and sons, Robert and Kenneth, were in Aberdeen Sunday to see Miss Ruth Wooten.

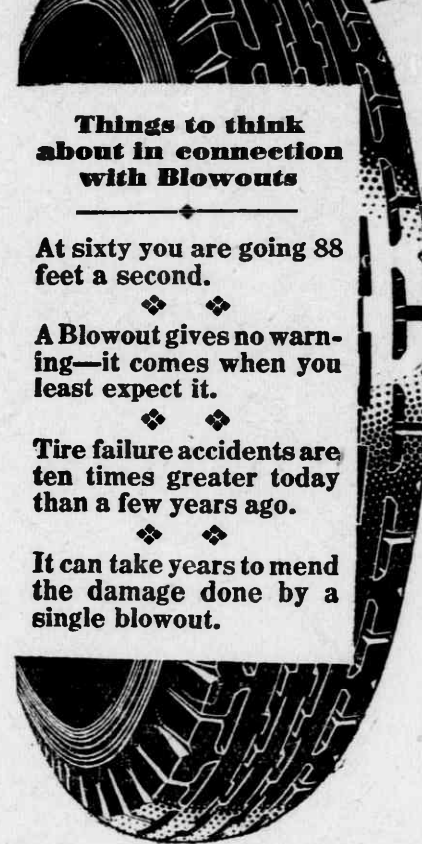

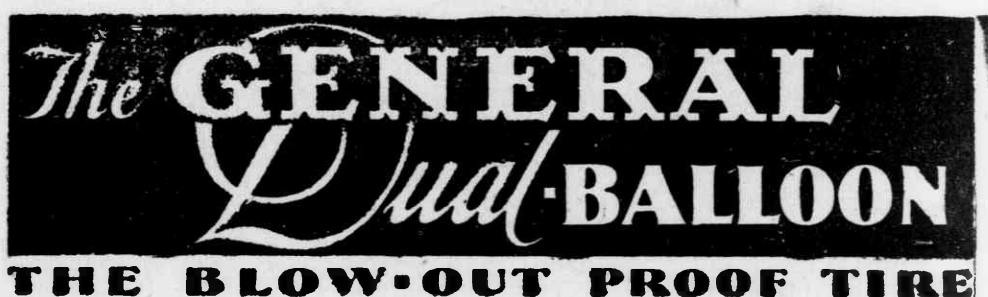
