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James L. Thomas Dies at Broadway Father of Superintendent o Schools of Moore County Was


Prominent Lee Citizen

James L. Thomas, one of the outstanding citizens of Lee county and father of H. Lee Thomas, superintendent of schools in Moore county passed away Tuesday evening at his home near Broadway, after a long illness with heart trouble. Mr. Thomas who was 69 years of age, was born and lived all of his life on the farm where his death occurred. He was the son o fthe late Mr. and. Mrs. William O. Thomas and a man of the highest character and strictest integrity. Mr. Thomas was highly esteemed and was justly regarded as a leading citizen. He refused public office but his influence was always for the things that helped the county and State. He was a man of excellent judgment and his counsel was frequently sought by friends and neighbors.

Mr. Thomas was chosen president of the Bank of Broadway when it was organized more than 20 years ago and continued as president until two years ago when because of ill health he declined re-election. 
